Shayla Adams has dedicated her life to serve and improve the lives of young adults by championing causes that promote educational equity for all. By day she is a U.S. History and Government teacher at Phelps ACE High School in Northeast DC, inspiring bright minds, but outside of her role as a teacher Shayla is a mentor, innovator and dedicated progressive leader. She is the founder of RemixEducation, a non-profit education organization whose mission is to provide innovative solutions in technology for teachers and students in order to bridge the education gap amongst minorities. Operating in North Carolina, Maryland, and Washington, DC., ReMixEducation currently organizes the Gloria Washington Wallace Young Leaders Scholarship in addition to two mentoring programs- H.E.R Story and L.I.F.E. I had the pleasure of meeting Shayla two years ago after signing up to be a mentor for H.E.R. Story in PG County. H.E.R. Story stands for Helping Empower Regalness and works with at-risk young women between the ages of 15-18. The program exposes young women to various post-secondary opportunities including workplace etiquette, CV creation, the college application process, domestic violence, sexual health and numerous community service opportunities. In its first year of operation, 100% of the program participants graduated from high school and were accepted into post-secondary institutions. Shayla is truly a young philanthropist who has given her time, energy and whole self to improving the livelihoods of others. The many lives she has touched through ReMixEducation and her efforts abroad are a testament to her passion to inspire, empower and create lasting change in the lives of our youth.

Dominique Broadway | Financial Freedom Changemaker

Daphne Charles | Educational Equity Changemaker

Daphne embodies a Changemaker. She is a giver of her time and money to causes she's passionate about. Earlier this year, Daphne led a Capital Cause Giving Circles Project team to surpass their fundraising goal to support a seed grant for the Dance, Dig & Dine summer program, raising over \$2,000 for the project which served 25 youth this past summer. She recently founded a nonprofit called Project Inspire and raises money to support college scholarships for youth in her high school. Over the past eight years, she has distributed almost \$3,000 in book scholarships for incoming college freshman through the scholarship. For the past seven years, Daphne has served as a Rap Director with College Summit, leading and inspiring hundreds of rising high school seniors on the steps necessary to go to college year after year. Almost monthly, Daphne is speaking to students in classrooms throughout Washington, D.C. and Maryland about the value of college and making positive choices. Outside of her volunteerism, Daphne works full time as a Site Coordinator for Community in Schools of Northern Virginia, where she works to reduce the dropout rate and increase the graduation rate at a school for nontraditional students.

He held 3 workshops per day for 1 week discussing change, decision making, etc. Will was asked to be the Keynote speaker at Andrew Jackson Academy in Prince Earlier this year will felt like there weren't enough positive images on TV so he decided to create and host his own talk show "In the Studio with Will J." that deals with Teen issues. So he reached out to some contacts he had and began working. Once a month Will invites young professionals and students on his show to discuss a variety of topics. Such as bullying, the Power of social media, Violence in our community, and being a young entrepreneur. He also coaches basketball every year where he not only teaches the game, he also mentors his players and encourages them to focus on school just as much as they focus on basketball. 
Renette Noel | NVUL-YPN Changemaker

Renette Noel deserves to be the Changemaker of the Year because I have not seen anyone exhibit more drive, determination, and effort to bring change to the communities in Northern Virginia. The Young Professionals Network of the Urban League in Northern Virginia would not have been known for their great reputation in serving the community if not for the time and effort that Renette puts in almost every day. She has planned and led numerous events for NVULYPN, including the 1st African American Read in Day at Drew Model School, the monthly Patrick Henry Shelter visits, the Comcast Cares Day in April, the annual College Survival 101 program, the annual Backpack Drive and AARP Canned Good Drive. In addition, not only does she plan and coordinate, but she makes sure her events get positive and measurable results. For example, after engaging the NVULYPN membership and reaching out to community organizations she was able to nearly double the amount of backpacks compared to last year's backpack drive. During the organization's AARP Canned Good Drive she set a goal for our group to donate 1,000 lbs. of canned goods and personal care items. Through her hard work, we were able to surpass that goal with 1,025 lbs. of donations. She's one of those people that doesn't rest until the job is done and is successful in her mind. And she aims high, knowing that not doing so would greatly hurt someone who is in need. And sometimes, when the help is not there for whatever reason, she will not hesitate to take it upon herself to make sure the community is being served. That's a determination that I have not personally seen very often, and that is why Renette Noel would be a great choice to be this year's Changemaker of the Year.

Caroline Sapp | Young Foreign Policy Changemaker

Caroline Sapp is passionate about integrating with and giving back to her local community. She volunteers to: (1) help to develop young professionals in the area of East Asian Studies and (2) work to improve food security for DC lowincome families. Ms. Sapp runs the East Asia discussion group for Young Professionals in Foreign Policy (YPFP), which is committed to fostering the next generation of foreign policy leaders. For the last two and half years she has built up a community of young professionals that meet to exchange ideas and brainstorm solutions to various policy problems in East Asian countries. In addition to discussions, Ms. Sapp has initiated language exchanges and volunteer projects for her group members.

Ms. Sapp has also participated in volunteer projects with the Urban League and Capital Cause, including assisting with taking children to a local DC museum. She also assisted the National Black United Front with brainstorming solutions to create community gardens in DCs Ward 8 and to get low-income families connected to free vouchers at the local food market. Finally, Caroline volunteers her time on Saturdays at the Mount Pleasant Farmer's Market running a federal benefits match program, increasing the purchasing power of low income families at farmer's markets. While at the market, Ms. Sapp also helps to educate families on how to select fresh produce on a budget and how to most efficiently utilize federal food assistance vouchers . Additionally, Ms. Sapp has begun teaching healthy cooking classes for families at DC Greens with children who are at risk of obesity.

Jeffrey Tribble | Musical Changemaker

Jeffery is the Executive Director of The MusicianShip, an organization that provides music lessons, opportunities, and experiences for youth who otherwise might not have access. Jeffery is unpaid for the work he does as is the organization's Board, and yet they manage to accomplish amazing results through partnerships with DCPS and other NGOs.

Mr. Tribble and his team works with mostly low-income youth from DC's poorest communities, committing their time to not only instruct them about playing instruments, but also to instill within them a desire to succeed academically. Filling a void that most music programs can't because of budget cuts, the Musicianship is a needed, well-organized, superbly-managed organization in our communities. This is largely thanks to Mr. Tribble who does not ever ask for reward, accolade or recognition for serving tomorrow's youth.

I could boast about the Musicianship winning a \$5,000 grant from the Sinfonia Educational Foundation, who stated that the Musicianship fills a "void" both now and in the future. A comment that was a nod to the leadership of Millennial, Jeffrey Tribble. However, these grants are only an indication of Mr. Tribble's servant leadership and selflessness.

It's for the aforementioned reason and countless others, that he deserves to be 2013 Changemaker of the Year.
